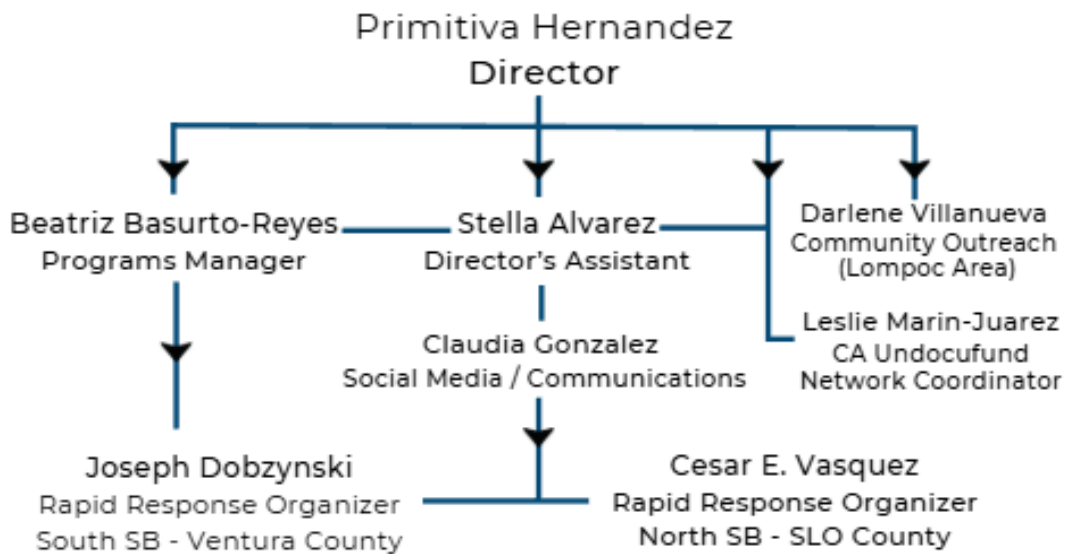

Equal Opportunity, Anti-discrimination, and Sexual Harassment Policies

Our Network prohibits unlawful discrimination based on any characteristic protected by law. Messaging Standards & Values Framework Purpose

805UndocuFund's messaging reflects who we are, what we stand for, and how we build power with undocumented and mixed-status communities across the Central Coast. Because our work operates at the intersection of immigration enforcement, disaster response, and systems change, our communication must be intentional, disciplined, and values-aligned. This framework establishes the standards that guide all public and internal messaging.

I. Grounding in Our Mission Mission:

To mobilize resources when disaster hits, provide short-term financial relief to undocumented residents, and advocate for long-term systems change to ensure equitable inclusion in disaster planning, preparedness, response, and recovery.

Messaging Standard:

Our communication must always reflect both:

- Immediate response (rapid response, emergency aid, stabilization) AND
- Long-term systems change (policy, accountability, structural reform) We are not only responding — We are transforming systems.

II. Anchored in Our Vision Vision:

A future where undocumented individuals and families have equitable access to resources to rebuild their lives with dignity after a disaster.

Messaging Standard:

All messaging must protect the dignity of undocumented and mixed-status families. We do not:

- Exploit trauma
- Sensationalize harm
- Use fear as a primary tactic
- Center the organization over the community

We do:

- Center resilience
- Highlight structural injustice
- Emphasize dignity, equity, and agency



III. Rooted in Our Values

1. Equity

Standard: Our language must reflect fairness, access, and structural accountability. We avoid narratives that frame communities as helpless. We emphasize systemic barriers and institutional responsibility.

2. Inclusion

Standard: Our messaging must reflect geographic, linguistic, and cultural inclusion across Ventura, Santa Barbara, and San Luis Obispo Counties. We avoid language that unintentionally excludes regions, partners, or volunteers.

3. Dignity

Standard: We speak about undocumented people as leaders, workers, parents, and community members — not as statistics or victims. We protect confidentiality and safety at all times.

4. Action

Every public message should clearly identify:

- The issue
- The impact
- The action needed

We do not create noise.
We create direction.

5. Solidarity

We uplift collective effort.

We avoid:

- Undermining partners publicly
- Creating internal division
- Messaging that destabilizes coalition relationships

Solidarity includes internal discipline.

6. Empathy



Standard: Our tone reflects care, not reaction.

Even when firm, our language should:

- Avoid dehumanization
- Avoid personal attacks
- Focus on systems, not individuals

7. Justice

Standard: We name injustice clearly and directly.

We connect:

- Enforcement harms
- Policy decisions
- Budget priorities
- Institutional accountability

We do not dilute structural critique — but we deliver it strategically.

8. Healing

Standard: Our messaging must avoid escalating fear unnecessarily.

We are stabilizers in crisis.

We communicate clarity, not chaos.

IV. Public Messaging Discipline

When representing 805UndocuFund, staff must:

- Speak within organizational scope
- Avoid statements that undermine organizational structure
- Avoid rhetoric that confuses allegiance or accountability
- Maintain alignment with approved strategy
- Separate personal activism from staff representation

We are accountable to the community through institutional infrastructure.

V. Tone Guidelines

Our tone should be:

- Grounded



- Strategic
- Clear
- Direct
- Disciplined
- Community-centered

Not:

- Reactive
- Polarizing for the sake of reaction
- Structurally destabilizing

VI. Messaging Structure Template

When crafting public remarks:

1. Identify yourself & role
2. Ground in mission
3. Name the issue
4. Center impact on undocumented families
5. Connect to systems
6. Make a clear ask
7. Close with values

VII. Internal Accountability

Message alignment is not optional.

It protects:

- Community trust
- Organizational legitimacy
- Staff safety
- Coalition relationships
- Long-term systems change strategy

Misalignment can create confusion, division, and institutional risk.

We are building movement infrastructure — and infrastructure requires discipline.



Volunteer Liability and Agreement Packet

I. Policies and Safety Rules

I will comply with 805 UndocuFund's volunteer policies, safety rules, conduct expectations, and other directions. I understand that 805 UndocuFund does not tolerate bullying, harassment, threatening behavior, or violence of any kind. I understand that noncompliance may result in termination of my volunteer status.

II. Volunteer Not an Employee

I understand that:

- (a) I am not an employee of 805 UndocuFund,
- (b) I will not be paid for my participation, and
- (c) I am not covered by or eligible for any 805 UndocuFund insurance, health care, worker's compensation, or other benefits. I understand that 805 UndocuFund may terminate my volunteer status at any time, for any or no reason.

III. Risks Associated with Volunteering

Volunteering for 805 UndocuFund has risks. These risks may arise in a variety of ways. They include, without limitation: my lifting heavy objects or otherwise exerting myself, handling glass, using hot or sharp objects or other tools, being exposed to dust, loud noises, and interacting with and being in the presence of other volunteers, visitors and other people. I understand that these risks include risks of injury, illness, death, and property damage or loss, and that they may arise from my own actions or from the actions of others at or near 805 UndocuFund facilities or encountered when traveling for Client activities off site. I also understand that even if 805 UndocuFund, I, and other persons present at 805 UndocuFund facilities follow all health and safety protocols, I may still be exposed to COVID-19 or other infectious diseases.



IV. Awareness and Assumption of Risk

I understand the information above, and confirm and acknowledge that these are risks associated with volunteering. With such information and awareness, and with the recognition that other factors may create additional such risks, I knowingly, freely, and voluntarily: (a) sign up to volunteer for Client; (b) engage in volunteer activities; and (c) assume and accept the risks of all injury, death, property damage or loss, financial obligation, loss of privacy, loss of reputation, and all other injuries and other consequences, whether known or unknown, whether foreseen or unforeseeable, and whether incurred at 805 UndocuFund facilities or elsewhere, that may result, directly or indirectly, from my presence at 805 UndocuFund facilities or participation as a 805 UndocuFund volunteer, regardless of the cause.

V. Waiver Agreement & Release of Claims

I waive and release 805 UndocuFund and its directors, officers, agents, employees, volunteers, and affiliates (collectively, "805 UndocuFund Parties") from any and all liability, claims, costs, and expenses of any kind and of whatever nature which I or my heirs, next of kin, or legal representatives may have or which may later accrue, caused by or arising directly or indirectly from my presence at 805 UndocuFund facilities or participation in 805 UndocuFund activities. This release and waiver includes, in each such case, all claims in respect of the risks noted above, known and unknown, foreseen and unforeseeable, regardless of the cause or whether such claims arise from tort, contract, or otherwise, and even if caused by negligence, whether passive or active. I will not sue any of the 805 UndocuFund Parties on the basis of these waived and released claims. I waive the protections of Section 1542 of the California Civil Code.

VI. Disclosure of Medical Conditions

I understand that I am solely responsible for knowing my own physical condition and making my own decision about volunteering. I have disclosed all medications and conditions relevant to my participation to my supervisor or other staff at 805



UndocuFund, including chronic conditions such as asthma, allergies, seizures, or diabetes. I understand that 805 UndocuFund needs such information because some medication side effects or medical conditions could affect my safety or that of others at 805 UndocuFund . I consent to 805 UndocuFund sharing this information with health professionals or first responders should I become ill or injured while at 805 UndocuFund facilities.

VII. Medical Care Consent and Waiver

I authorize 805 UndocuFund to provide me with first aid and to arrange medical assistance, transportation, and emergency medical services for me if I get hurt while volunteering. I understand that 805 UndocuFund is not obligated to provide this care. I also understand that I am solely responsible for any costs related to my medical treatment and transport, and that 805 UndocuFund does not provide health, medical, disability, or other insurance coverage for me.

VIII. Confidentiality

I may have access to 805 UndocuFund 's confidential information. At all times during and after my participation, I agree to hold any such confidential information in confidence and not disclose or use it except as 805 UndocuFund expressly authorizes.

IX. Confidentiality

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X. Assignment of Work Product

I grant full rights to 805 UndocuFund in any reports, brochures, website content, photos, images, videos, or other materials or works I may create in the course of



volunteer activities, and any intellectual property rights in or derivatives of such materials.

XI. Use by Client of My Name and Image

I understand that 805 UndocuFund may take photos or videos of me. I consent to use by Client of my image, voice, name, and story, and of images of any works I may create as a volunteer (collectively, "Materials"), in 805 UndocuFund's digital and print promotional, fundraising, educational, and other communications, unless otherwise verbally or contractually withdrawing consent. 805 UndocuFund may use the Materials without obtaining my approval or paying me for such use. I grant 805 UndocuFund all copyrights in and waive any legal claims relating to the Materials, including those relating to copyright, rights of publicity or privacy, or defamation, or arising from any distortion, blurring, or alteration that may occur in the making, editing, or use of the Materials.

XII. General Provisions

I understand that this Agreement will be binding for so long as I am a volunteer at 805 UndocuFund. This Agreement will run in favor of, and may be enforced by, each of the 805 UndocuFund Parties, and will bind my heirs, next of kin, and legal representatives. This Agreement will be binding to the fullest extent permitted by law. If any provision of this Agreement is found to be unenforceable, the other terms remain effective. This Agreement will be governed by California law. **I will verbally, contractually, or otherwise indicate when I wish to revise or modify this agreement.**

Are you federally funded?

No, we do not receive federal funding. We are sustained by private funding like donors or foundations. You can find our reports all on our website to download and review!

Can I specify what to donate for/to?

Yes! You can select a specific fund (EAF, natural disaster, general assistance), and make a note on whether you want it allocated to a specific region or purpose.

What happened with Flipcause?

Unfortunately, in 2025 we lost ~350k in donations for families and assistance due to the fundraiser platform CEOs filing for bankruptcy and pulling assets in early 2025. We did not receive notice from the district attorney until November. We had suspicions and concerns as early as May 2025. Please refer to online articles for full details on updates.

What is the Emergency Assistance Fund?
Who is eligible?

The “EAF” or **Emergency Assistance Fund** is for families in our tri-county regions who have had a loved one detained or deported since January 2025. Families receive a stipend for assistance with rent or utilities of \$1k. They can reach out via the hotline or the website for application at **(805)870-8855**.
